

RESOLUTION NO. 11-81

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
LAKE SHASTINA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING AND COMMENDING THE LAKE SHASTINA POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE ATTORNEY GENERAL FOR THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA FOR THEIR ACTIVE INTEREST IN REDUCING CRIME AND IMPLEMENTING COMPREHENSIVE CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS.

WHEREAS, one United States household in five has been hit by crime at least once in the last twelve months, with either property stolen or a member of the household the victim of a physical assault, according to the findings of a national poll released in December, 1979; and

WHEREAS, the survey findings parallel the upturn in crime reported by the Federal Bureau of Investigation which reported increases in every kind of major crime for the first six months of 1980; and

WHEREAS, there has been insufficient public attention to the rights and plight of crime victims in our society and to effective crime prevention programs to reduce the numbers of crime victims; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to inform the public of and broaden the availability and merit of effective methods of crime prevention to help minimize further disruption in the lives of crime victims; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Shastina Police Department is responsive to the need to reduce and prevent crime and its fear posed by the recorded increases in criminal activity and has demonstrated its concern for the safety of its citizens on the street and in their homes by implementing locally a comprehensive crime prevention program:

NOW, THEREFORE, WE THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the Lake Shastina Community Services District, on behalf of its citizens, do hereby commend and support the Lake Shastina Police Department's Crime Prevention Program, THE CALIFORNIA CRIME WATCH PROGRAM and the Attorney General's Plan to Restore Public Safety in the 80's.





In response to a question from Director Miralles, General Manager Smith stated that the police and fire vehicles are treated as capital assets not booked for depreciation. In the discussion which ensued, Director Miralles brought out that replacement of a fire engine would be in the neighborhood of \$50,000 for a used one. Government surplus vehicles are almost unavailable. The present fire truck is getting pretty old, and the tank has leaked and been repaired once already, which is a stop gap measure. When a tank rusts through in one place, look out for other places. Even though the 1972 International Fire Truck has only 4,000 miles on the engine, you run into the problem of obsolescence when trying to obtain replacement parts. In addition, it is not just the engine which needs to be considered, it is also the tank and the pump. Director Worsnop agreed that from a practical standpoint, money must be set aside for replacement purposes; you cannot address current expenses only.

Chief Allen reported that the VFD has been making fire flue inspections. Individual firemen will fix stove pipes, putting in sheet metal screws, and such, at no charge. It has been a very quiet month with no callouts, as indicated on his written report submitted to the Members of the Board.

3. Police Department Report - Chief Bailey

Chief Bailey reported that he hopes to have the crime prevention program in full swing by the first of November. He is about 95% sure of getting grant money for this program. On the 7th of November the Attorney General's crime prevention unit will be at Lake Shastina. The news media, other law enforcement agencies, and the general public will be invited to attend. He would like to get the whole community involved.

Chief Bailey stated that we are now ready to go with POST. we meet all their requirements relating to training of law enforcement officers under Section 13522 of the State penal code.

In relation to the above two programs, he has prepared two Resolutions: one supporting and commending the LSPD and the

Attorney General for their active interest in implementing crime prevention programs, and the other accepting the requirements of Section 13522 of the penal code relating to the training of law enforcement officers. This latter resolution is required in order to receive reimbursement from the State for expenses incurred in attending POST meetings.

Director Miralles moved the resolution supporting and commending the LSPD and the Office of the State Attorney General in implementing a crime prevention program be passed by the Board. This motion was seconded by Director Applegate. AYES and therefore in favor of, Directors Applegate, Carter, Miralles and Worsnop.

Director Miralles moved the resolution accepting the requirements of Section 13522 of the State Penal Code relating to training of law enforcement officers be adopted. This motion was seconded by Director Applegate. AYES and therefore in favor of, Directors Applegate, Carter, Miralles and Worsnop.

POST REQUIR-
MENTS

Chief Bailey has prepared a proposed Animal Control Ordinance. Gen. Mgr. Smith asked that it be posted prior to a public hearing to allow District residents to review it. The Ordinance would then become effective thirty days after Board approval subsequent to the public hearing. Counsel Sherman stated he would like to see some language posted which would indicate that proposed Ordinances, as posted, could be changed by the Board and would then become effective thirty days after Board approval.

PROPOSED
ANIMAL CON-
TROL ORD.

It was moved by Director Worsnop to post the proposed Ordinance as a preliminary draft, with the appropriate qualifer as suggested by Counsel regarding possible changes. This motion was seconded by Director Miralles. AYES and therefore in favor of, Directors Applegate, Carter, Miralles and Worsnop.

Counsel Sherman suggested that Section 3 "Leash Law" of the proposed animal control ordinance be changed to delete "poultry and fowl" from this section. This change was concurred with by the Board and the Secretary was so instructed.
